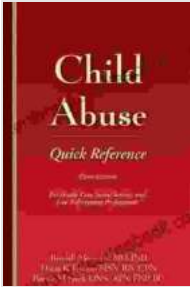

What is Child Abuse?

Risk Factors for Child Abuse

There are a number of risk factors that can increase a child's risk of being abused. These risk factors include:

- Poverty
- Parental substance abuse
- Parental mental illness
- Domestic violence
- Exposure to violence in the community
- Having a disability
- Being in foster care

Consequences of Child Abuse

Child abuse can have a devastating impact on a child's physical, emotional, and mental health. The consequences of child abuse can include:

- Physical injuries
- Developmental delays
- Mental health problems
- Behavioral problems
- Increased risk of future victimization
- Death

Prevention of Child Abuse

There are a number of things that can be done to prevent child abuse.

These include:

- Educating parents and caregivers about child abuse
- Providing support to families at risk
- Strengthening child protection laws
- Creating safe and supportive communities
- Empowering children to speak out about abuse

Treatment of Child Abuse

- Medical care
- Counseling
- Support groups
- Educational services
- Child protective services

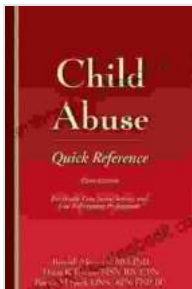

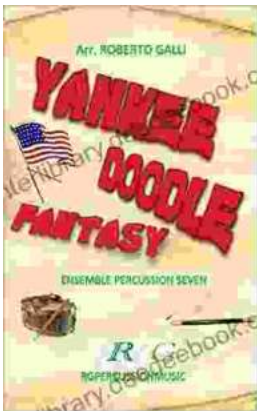
